# Construction Updates

## Continuing work around Renfrew County's roads

The County of Renfrew has several construction projects underway in the region. For the week of August 5 to 9, the following information is provided.

**Rook Culvert: Township of Admaston/Bromley**

Rook Culvert located on Burwell Road is currently closed indefinitely, pending culvert replacement. Detours are posted.

**Victoria Street:**

**Town of Petawawa**

The reconstruction of Victoria Street between Wolfe Avenue and West Street began on August 6th and will continue until mid-November. During construction, the road will be reduced to a single lane of traffic. Alternate routes will be posted.

**Petawawa Boulevard:**

**Town of Petawawa**

Resurfacing of the road in the vicinity of the Mohns Avenue and Doran Road intersection is

scheduled to commence during the week of August 6th. During this time, the road will remain open to traffic. Lane shifts and reductions may be in place at times.

**Rockingham Road: Townships of Madawaska Valley and Brudenell, Lyndoch & Raglan**

The rehabilitation of Rockingham Road from 0.6 km east of Palmer Road to 0.5 km east of Guiney Road is continuing. Construction is expected to last until mid-August. The road will remain open for the duration of the contract but may be reduced to one lane at times.

**Norton Road: Township of Greater Madawaska**

The reconstruction of Norton Road south of Pucker Street is continuing. The project is scheduled to be completed by late-August. The road will remain open but may be reduced to one lane at times.

**Forest Lea Road: Township of Laurentian Valley**

The rehabilitation of Forest Lea Road from Pembroke Street West to Highway 17 will continue. The project is expected to be completed by August 9th.

**Balaclava Bridge: Township of Bonnechere Valley**

Balaclava Bridge, located on Scotch Bush Road, will remain closed for replacement. During construction, detours will be in place via Highway 41, Highway 132 and Constant Lake Road.

**Opeongo Road: Township of Bonnechere Valley**

The rehabilitation of Opeongo Road from 0.7 km west of McGrath Road to 3.3 kms east of McGrath Road is scheduled to be complete by August 9th. Motorists are advised of loose gravel conditions on this roadway. Please drive carefully and obey the posted speed limits.

**Centennial Lake Bridge: Twp. of Greater Madawaska**

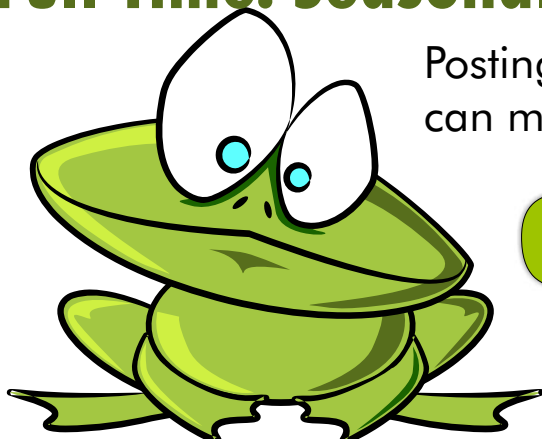
Construction on Centennial Lake Bridge, located on Centennial Lake Road, continues. This project is scheduled to continue until the fall of 2014. Traffic over the bridge is reduced to a single lane, controlled with traffic signals. The bridge is restricted to vehicles and equipment in excess of 3.1m. Please expect delays.

**Indian River Bridge: Twp. of Laurentian Valley**

The rehabilitation of Indian River Bridge on Round Lake Road will continue until end of August. Traffic over the bridge is reduced to a single lane, controlled with traffic signals. The bridge is restricted to vehicles and equipment in excess of 3.3m. Please expect delays.

# Business News Around The Valley

## Chutes Coulonge Re-Opens

Chutes Coulonge has re-opened with partial operation. Clean-up from the July storm that ripped through the Pontiac continues, but the popular tourist attraction has been able to open with access to some parts of the operation. Some walking trails are open, and the two ziplines and rock climbing are open. .

## Benny Afelskie Passes

Benny Afelskie has passed away in Killaloe at the age of 85. Afelskie was the second generation owner of Afelskie Shoes, which is now operated by the third generation of the family. Benny worked at the store until he was 82 years old. Known for his community spirit, he was the subject of a play by Stone Fence Theatre in 2008 called Tales of Benny Afelskie.

## Redesignation Sought

The owner of a commercial property at 145 William Street in Pembroke is hopeful to have the property re-designated for a better sale opportunity. The City see no issue to impede the change as residential uses neighbour the property, along with institutional uses. The property is near the Pembroke courthouse. The issue will go before council with a public meeting held in advance.

## BIA Could Fold

The Business Improvement Area (BIA) in Arnprior could be dissolved. With lack of quorum to operate BIA business, the Town of Arnprior is now involved. A decision could be forthcoming as early as September to determine the fate of the BIA.

## Grand Re-Opening

The Woodworking Factory in Pembroke has celebrated its move to a new location at 130 Belmonte Avenue. The Factory is run by the Pembroke Regional Hospital's Community Mental Health Services. The business produces a variety of wood products, in addition to providing custom work. They are open Monday to Friday from 9:00am to 4:00pm.

## Renfrew Most Expensive For Taxes

The Town of Renfrew has taken over top spot as being the municipality with the highest tax rates in Renfrew County (excluding the City of Pembroke.) The position was previously held by the Town of Deep River, who has had three years of declining tax rates, and now sits in second place on the list. Renfrew has a residential tax rate of 8.648 percent while Deep River is now at 8.584 per cent.

## Pembroke Medi Spa Hours

Pembroke Medi Spa in Pembroke will be closed from August 3 to August 11 for holidays. They will re-open on August 12 at Noon.

**AECL Changes Underway**  
Changes are coming to AECL and it could be good news for the region. While plans for the federal government agency include privatizing some of the site, there appears to be another plan to invite new companies to work in the region, and employing current AECL employees in the process. Proposals are ongoing and due by early 2014 with a contract award by 2015.

## City Bypasses Bylaw

The City of Pembroke chose to bypass its own sign bylaw in order to allow an electronic advertising sign to be erected on the KI Pembroke property. The sign was proposed by Chris Hermitte (Wallscape Banners) and Dan Mellen (KI Pembroke).

## OPG Under Construction

The new 20,000 square foot headquarters for Renfrew's Ontario Power Generation has broken ground on construction. The new facility is financed by Wilson Investments of Renfrew and will be built by Arnprior's M. Sullivan and Son. A complex is being planned that will also

host other businesses. The property is owned by Wilson Investments.

**Hospital Expansion Begins**  
Renfrew Victoria Hospital is starting the first phase of their expansion - a parking lot for the \$12 million nephrology building. The expansion will assist people with chronic kidney problems. Work on the actual building is expected to start in 2014.

## Parks Off Limits

16 parks and open spaces in the Town of Petawawa have been closed until staff can review the property and declare it safe for residents. The spaces incurred damage from the recent storm and contain down and damaged trees. Residents may still bring their brush to the Back 40 of the Petawawa Civic Centre or leave it piled along the curb, ensuring it is not spilling into a roadway.

## Enbridge Gas Decreasing Then Increasing Rates

Enbridge Gas Distribution is changing its rates for customers. The average residential customer will receive a \$3 discount in 2014, but will see increases of \$12 in 2015 and \$27 in 2016. ## Smoking Regulated On Town Property

The Town of Petawawa has passed a by-law to regulate and prohibit smoking on municipally owned property. The by-law applies to all municipal property with the exception of municipal road allowances and public sidewalks. However, there are designated smoking areas at the Petawawa Civic Centre, Centennial Park and Petawawa Point Beach.

Wynne visited Schroeder Beef Farm in Rankin and the Klaesi Farm in Foresters Falls. She met with local farmers and members of the Ontario Federation of Agriculture.

Clean-up for the City of Pembroke's July storm has come in with a bill of \$56,000. The majority of the cost is for removal of brush and trees.

# 96,000 Hectares Preserved

## Government cashes in on Algonquin tourists

The Province of Ontario is reducing the opportunity for logging in Algonquin Park, citing it as an "ecological" decision that still maintains a healthy forestry sector.

The newly amended park management plan increases the amount of protected land within Algonquin Provincial Park by 96,000 hectares. This amounts to 1.5 times the size of the City of Toronto. The newly protected area includes: almost 70,000 hectares along waterways, more than 14,000

hectares of land zoned wilderness, and more than 12,000 hectares of nature reserves. This amendment is part of the government's plan to keep Ontario's parks beautiful and improve wilderness recreation.

**Quick Facts**

The amended park plan follows extensive consultation with park stakeholders. Algonquin Provincial Park is known as the crown jewel of Ontario's provincial park system and is the oldest in the

province. At 763,459 hectares in size, it is larger than Prince Edward Island.

In 2012, Ontario's provincial parks had over nine million visitors, with 800,000 to Algonquin. The total revenue from all visitors was more than \$89 million.

Algonquin is the only provincial park to support forest management. The Logging Museum at the park's east gate pays tribute to this important economic activity.

## MP Hands Out Federal Money

### EODP, New Horizons find projects locally

MP Cheryl Gallant has been busy awarding funding from the federal government through the Eastern Ontario

Development Program. While a list of recipients of the program has been requested, it is not yet available.

Thus far, the following businesses have been recipients of the funding.

The Natural Health Centre in Madawaska Valley Township received nearly \$33,000 to provide barrier free services for their building.

Madawaska Doors, also in Madawaska Valley, received more than \$92,000 for youth internships to promote a new ultra-thin environmentally friendly insulation system.

Laurentian View Dairy received \$5,000 to purchase a real-time inventory tracking system.

ETM Industries was awarded \$8,000 for technical training.

Finally, Brian and Angie McNish of Top O' the Morning Cafe received \$1,750 for a website and social media.

In additional funding news, the Eganville Seniors Centre received almost \$21,000 through the New Horizons Program, which is also a federal program. The money will be used to expand their storage facility.

# How To Be A Healthy Non-Profit

## It's much like being a healthy business

One thing that has always bothered me in business is when non-profit organization use their status as a reason why a business should do something free of charge for them. For some organizations, the term "non-profit" seems to suggest that they are entitled to have things given to them, where others would be required to pay. I'm not really sure why that feeling is out there, especially since the difference between "non-profit" and "for-profit" is almost non-existent.

A non-profit is a legal entity that is allowed to raise money

and be profitable, just like a for-profit business. The difference is that funds raised by a non-profit must be re-distributed within the organization, whereas funds raised by a for-profit can go into the owner's pocket. A non-profit is often governed by a Board of Directors, while a for-profit is governed by owners. Both can have staff, pay salaries, have office expenses and be required to operate within provincial, federal and local laws.

Non-profits and for-profits both have budgets with draws of income and costs of expenses. Both can have savings and investments, and both are accountable to Canada Revenue Agency at the end of the year.

The truth is, when a non-profit asks for something for free, it is not because they are unable to pay for it, it is

because they have chosen not to include it in their budget. Simply put, other items took precedence in being funded. Much like in a for-profit entity, you put your money where you feel it is most needed and will yield the best result. Non-profits are no different.

Being a healthy non-profit is all about numbers: this is what we want to achieve, this is how much it will cost and this is how we will do it. Am I simplifying that? Not at all. Once the work is done behind the scenes (investigating options, pricing out costs, etc.) this is exactly what remains. The work behind the scenes is the core of the organization evaluating the goals and making sure they are realistic, that the budget is responsible and that the organization continues to be sustainable. And a sustainable organization

is a healthy organization.

The most successful non-profits are the ones with a good plan to support them. There is less anxiety over success because there is a clear list of goals and the appropriate budget to succeed. The organization is not afraid to make money to reinvest in itself so programs and services continue to benefit those who need them. This commitment is admirable as it means the organization is committed to being around for a long time.

There is often an element of emotion attached to why a non-profit exists. As an entrepreneur, I can tell you that same emotion exists for a for-profit's existence. The only thing better than being passionate about what you do, is having a plan that ensures you can continue to do it. And for many, that is an investment worth making.
