Endangered Species Act (ESA)

This is a significant issue for rural Ontario and for Renfrew County. It has created a number of problems, increased costs and significant work delays and stoppages for businesses in almost all economic sectors in our diverse community.

Agriculture, construction, road

building, land development, new home construction, forestry, mining and tourism have all been adversely affected by the time consuming and complicated requirements of the ESA. We have been told there have been job losses and missed investment opportunities. Our partners tell us that in many situations, the ESA duplicates the requirements of existing Acts, such as the Ontario Planning Act, and specific Forest Management Plans. County staff recently prepared an excellent and very comprehensive report that involved wide consultation with affected individuals and businesses.

We expect and our community expects it to remain one of the world's premier nuclear research facility as it evolves. Recently a delegation from Renfrew County visited several nuclear science and technology, research and development and radio-active waste management facilities and business clusters and their host communities in the United States. The delegation left Canada with two objectives.

First, we conducted an exploration of business opportunities and potential investment attraction to the County of Renfrew through prospecting industries involved in nuclear science and technology specifically, and other advanced manufacturing and research and development activities generally.

Second, with the selection of a private company to operate

AECL under a government-owned, company-operated (GOCO) model, it was highly informative to learn how other communities and regions have adjusted to this change from a government structure to private sector environment, and how they have managed their economic development investment attraction, community growth and labour force retention and development under a completely different operational structure.

We visited laboratories, science and technology clusters and waste management operations which have similarities to CRL and the County of Renfrew environment. We gained a valuable perspective on what challenges and opportunities our community may face as AECL evolves here in the County.

The delegation heard countless times how valued an asset AECL and Chalk River

Laboratories and the staff were and the importance of this GOCO being framed as an opportunity - this is much, much more than a shut down and clean up. CRL needs to be developed as Canada's national laboratory and a valued and primary growth hub for Renfrew County, Eastern Ontario, the Province of Ontario and Canada.

It remains the contention of this council that AECL is located here in the perfect community. We accept and support nuclear industry and science. AECL and the laboratories belong here. To move them or in any way systematically diminish them is to ignore the glorious and productive past, the significant present value and the limitless future.

Garrison Petawawa

Garrison Petawawa continues to evolve and grow. The many benefits accrued by our community extend beyond the Town of Petawawa. It generates income for many, opportunity to provide services and goods for others and a strong group of volunteers who care about and build our community.

Renfrew County has always and continues to have a strong and emotional attachment and relationship with Garrison Petawawa. 
CAO Jim Hutton and myself will continue to support the efforts of EOWC and ensure the concerns of the County of Renfrew are duly considered.

Neat Café

Obtains Approvals

Neat Cafe in Burnstown has a new liquor license that allows for full occupancy in both spaces. The business, the Township of McNab Braeside and the McNab Braeside Fire Department managed to come to an agreement that allowed for the expansion of the business. Owners Adam and Kim McKinty are thankful to all who helped make it happen.

Town Requests Funding

The Town of Petawawa is requesting funding in the amount of \$661,441 from the Small, Rural and Northern Municipal Infrastructure Fund to assist in paying for the Victoria Street/East Street/Abbie Lane Sanitary Sewer Upgrade.

MNR Closes Program In Pembroke

The Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources will cease operations of its fire management program in Kirkland Lake and Pembroke at the end of 2013. Two staff from the fire management program will remain in Pembroke to support fire operations and fire prevention. The decision will not impact MNR's ability to respond strategically to forest fires.

Local Business Wins Tender Arnprior Fire Trucks has been awarded the contract for the manufacturing of two more purpose built fire apparatus. Norfolk County awarded the tender of a Walk-Around Rescue and a Triple Combination Pumper to AFTC, to be completed and delivered in 2014. Manufacturing of the trucks will be at the company's plant in Arnprior.

Needle, Medication Disposal Information

The Ottawa Valley Waste Recovery Centre (OVWRC) reminds residents that used needles, lancets and other sharps as well as unused or expired medication is not permitted as part of regular waste for the Centre. All needles can be returned to local pharmacies after they have been placed in a sharps container, and used or expired medications are also accepted at pharmacies. The OVWRC also accepts unused or expired medications and needles at the Centre's Hazardous Waste Depot from residents within the Town of Petawawa, City of Pembroke, Township of Laurentian Valley, Township of North Algona Wilberforce and Sebastopol Ward of Bonnechere Valley. Needles

must be safely packaged in a plastic container, sealed and labeled needles or in a designated sharps container.

Canada Summer Jobs Employer Deadlines

Employers are reminded that applications are now open for Canada Summer Jobs. The application period begins on December 2nd, 2013 and will remain open until January 10th, 2014. Funding opportunities are available to not-for-profit organizations, public-sector employers and small businesses with 50 or fewer employees under the CSJ program. Applicants must create summer job opportunities for young people aged 15 to 30 years, who are full-time students intending to return to their studies in the next school year.

Building Permits in Whitewater Region

The Township of Whitewater Region issued 29 building permits in November: two single family dwellings, three single family additions, 12 accessory buildings, four agricultural, three demolition and five septic permits. The total cost of construction was \$1,228,643.65.

Emon Acclaimed

Greater Madawaska Mayor Peter Emon has been acclaimed as Warden of the County of Renfrew. Mayor Emon ran for the position uncontested. He was nominated by Admaston Bromley mayor Raye-Anne Briscoe and seconded by Richard Rabishaw, mayor of Laurentian Hills. This is Emon's second term as Warden.

Physician Retirement In Renfrew

The Renfrew & Area Health Services Village will be losing one of their physicians in May 2014, but hopes to have another recruit in place before the departure. Dr. John Collins has a patient list of approximately 1,500 and is leaving the practice to retire.

Peaks Awarded Warden's Medal

The County of Renfrew has recognized Calabogie Peaks Resort for its commitment to social responsibility. The business supports the Canadian Association for Disabled Skiing, and an affordable winter ski program for local children. The

recognition is part of the Warden's awards.

Rails To Go In Pontiac
MRC Pontiac lost the court challenge to force the rails to be kept in their region. The MRC had created a bylaw to require the rail to remain in the ground, but a judge from Quebec Superior Court refused to grant a permanent injunction to prevent the railway from removing the tracks. The judge ruled that the MRC overstepped its jurisdiction, and that CN rail followed the appropriate procedure under the Canada Transportation Act.

Town To Assume Ski Hill
The Town of Petawawa will be taking over operation of Molson Ski Hill in 2015. The decision has been in the works for some time and will become official after this current ski season. The local hill is renowned for being the "world's shortest downhill" and has been the starting place for many local skiers who have gone on to significant sport achievements.

Lifetime Achievement Award
Eileen Malette, owner of

Custom Draperies has been awarded the Lifetime Achievement Award in Business by the Upper Ottawa Valley Chamber of Commerce. The award recognizes someone who has more than 25 years in business and has been a leader in the business community. The award was chosen by the Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors.

Petawawa Building Permits

The Town of Petawawa has earned over \$92,000 in building permit fees as of October 2013, for a value of more than \$25 million in permit values. To date, 279 permits have been issued by the municipality. The November numbers increased by just over \$2,000 in permit fees, and \$400,000 in permit values.

OVWRC Announces 2014 Tipping Fees

The Ottawa Valley Waste Management Board recently approved the 2014 Tipping Fees. These are the fees customers pay for disposing of waste and other materials at the Ottawa Valley Waste Recovery Centre. The new fees are effective January 1st, 2014. The tipping fee schedule is also designed to encourage separation of materials for recycling or composting. The Contaminated Load fee (formerly Mixed Waste) has increased slightly from \$215 to \$225. This higher fee is applied to landfill loads which contain recyclable, compostable, construction/demolition material, hazardous or electronic waste and/or tires. The fees for disposing of construction and demolition (C&D) waste remain the same in 2014. And from April 1st to October 31st customers will continue to have an opportunity to bring in

unsorted C&D waste for \$175 per tonne. Sorted C&D waste is charged at \$75 per tonne. Construction and demolition loads that can be reasonably sorted by staff, are deposited in the C&D Sorting Area. This project has been running for two years and has helped divert 250 tonnes of C&D material from landfill. It will now become part of the Centre's regular operations. Landfill tipping fees have increased slightly from \$85 per tonne to \$87 per tonne and Contaminated Soils, including Hydrocarbon, have decreased to \$80 per tonne from \$100 per tonne. This reflects the fact that contaminated soils, once tested and aerated, can be used in the landfill operations as daily cover. The minimum fee to dispose of landfill material remains the same at \$15 (200 kg & under). A complete fee schedule is available at www.ovwrc.com.
